Having a bias doesn't make a person "bad," and not every bias is negative. However, the inability to recognize and interrupt the biases in ourselves and others can lead to bad decisions in our work, in our relationships and in life.

The reality is that each of us, no matter how open-minded we think we are, possess hidden prejudgments that influence our behavior and cause us to make decisions about cases, people and situations based on what we think we know, versus what we really know as facts. Implicit bias is widespread and can be found in every discipline. In business, it can affect how decisions are made about hiring, firing, discipline, promotions and job assignments. As we deal with our cases, our biases, can influence how we perceive our own clients and other individuals, how we assemble the team, how we think about negotiations and outcomes, how we select a jury and how a case is put together.

This discussion will focus on how we can recognize and interrupt our own biases as well as recognizing and interrupting biases in others
