SHORT TITLE: Invertebrates & Rare Plants Parks & Wildlife Commission

LONG TITLE: Concerning including certain species under the authority of the state agencies that regulate parks and wildlife.

COMMITTEES: House Agriculture, Water & Natural Resources Committee

SPONSORS: Representatives Soper and McCormick/Senator Marchman

PURPOSE OF THE BILL: Concerning including certain species under the authority of the state agencies that regulate parks and wildlife and requires a General Fund appropriation to study invertebrates.

PROPONENTS OF THE BILL: conservation organizations and biodiversity proponents, DNR?

POTENTIAL STAKEHOLDERS: conservation organizations; farmers and ranchers

BACKGROUND: Imperiled or potentially imperiled plants are added to the species conservation trust fund, and this addition allows the money in the fund to be spent for conservation of these plants.

Is this bill necessary this year? There is no deadline.

How does the bill change current law? It adds invertebrates and rare plants to the protection of CPW and requires funding.

Does the bill affect the prior appropriations system? No

How is the bill implemented? It adds rare plants to the list and directs CPW to investigate and survey rare plants and invertebrates when it determines appropriate.

Practical considerations: Does this bill take money away from other species necessary for the development of important water projects?

Fiscal Impact: Imperiled or potentially imperiled plants are added to the species conservation trust fund, and this addition allows the money in the fund to be spent for conservation of these plants. I directs the General Assembly to appropriate money from the General Fund or the Wildlife Cash fund but not from hunting and fishing license fees. There is no fiscal note.
