Forging a Path Forward for Urban/Ag Water Sharing in the Arkansas River Basin

The CWCB's 2025 updated report for Collaborative Water Sharing Agreements notes the sustained interest in developing these agreements in the Lower Arkansas Valley. Yet, urban growth is seen as a barrier by some for maintaining a robust agricultural sector. The panel will discuss the realities of this flashpoint and opportunities to build knowledge and interest in a viable vision for leveraging water sharing to meet the needs of all users of the river.

This workshop will showcase a range of voluntary conservation practices currently being implemented in the Upper Basin and explore both the opportunities and challenges of achieving meaningful, measurable water savings. We will examine the biological, economic, and social factors that must be considered when designing a future program. Through on the ground examples of seasonal fallowing, split season irrigation, and crop switching, a central question we will address is: How can we sustain the viability of farms, ranches, and rural communities while balancing the increasing demands on the Colorado River? Participants will have the opportunity to engage directly with agricultural producers, community leaders, and researchers to shape durable, collaborative solutions for the river's future.
